I. Work Cited

Author. "Article." Magazine. day month year. page.

Example: Carter, Stephen. "Let Us Pray." The New Yorker. 5 Dec. 1994. 60.

Last name, first name. "Article title." Site name. Date of publication day month year. Web. Date of access day month year.

Example: Ehrler, Christi and Erin Wells. "Welcome to Paradise." CNN. 10 Sept. 2011. Web. 29 October 2013. www.cnn.com.

- II. Main Idea Summarize the main idea of the article in <u>one sentence</u>.
- III. Paraphrase Choose a quote that best reflects the main idea. The quote must be 2 to 3 sentences long. Write out the quote and then paraphrase it. Paraphrase means to take the idea of another writer and state it in your own words.

The assignment must be typed, 12 point, Times New Roman, double spaced. Follow the format above and label each section.
